RULES REVIEW COMMITTEE MINUTES

The two hundred sixtieth meeting of the Rules Review Committee was called to order by Chair Representative Jean Hunhoff at 9:00 a.m., August 9, 2005, in Room 413 of the State Capitol, Pierre, South Dakota.

A quorum was determined with the following members answering the roll call: Senators Jim Hundstad and Orville Smidt (Vice-Chair); and Representatives Jean Hunhoff (Chair) and Bill Thompson. Senator Eric Bogue was excused. Representative Roger Hunt was present following the roll call.

Staff members present included Doug Decker, Code Counsel, and Kris Schneider, Legislative Secretary.

All material distributed at the meeting is attached to the original minutes on file in the Legislative Research Council (LRC). For the purpose of continuity, these minutes are not necessarily in chronological order.

Approval of Minutes

Senator Hundstad moved, seconded by Senator Smidt, that the minutes of the June 14, 2005, meeting be approved. Motion prevailed on a roll call vote with 4 ayes, 2 excused. Members voting aye: Hundstad, Hunhoff, Smidt, and Thompson. Excused: Bogue and Hunt.

Rules Reviewed

Department of Health: Board of Chiropractic Examiners - Amend rules to update the licensing procedure to provide for a nonrefundable \$100 as part of the initial license fee and further to provide for the criminal background investigation for applicants, to clarify the reciprocity provisions, to incorporate into approved continuing education courses a recognized approval organizations listings, to clarify preceptor selection, and to remove the term "gross" from professional conduct and to delete redundant and outdated rules.

Mr. Tom Stanton, Rapid City, attorney for the Board of Chiropractic Examiners, and **Dr. Mark Steiner**, Pierre, member of the Board of Chiropractic Examiners, reviewed the proposed rules.

Senator Hundstad moved, seconded by Representative Thompson, to approve the rules proposed by the Department of Health: Board of Chiropractic Examiners. Motion prevailed on a roll call vote with 4 ayes, 2 excused. Members voting aye: Hundstad, Hunhoff, Smidt, and Thompson. Excused: Bogue and Hunt.

Department of Revenue and Regulation: Gaming Commission - Amend rules to clarify that when stakes races are declared off, refunds for subscriptions and fees are only made for stakes race finals; provide a mechanism for reimbursement to the racing stewards for mileage, per diem and lodging on hearings at locations other than the Association grounds; require that licensees notify the executive secretary in writing, before a game tournament begins, as to the number of tables involved and the South Dakota stamp identification number of each table; increase the amount of overages or shortages that must be reported to the Commission from \$50 to \$100; require cashiers to validate vouchers and to require the cashiers sign paper tokens and casino scripts; and eliminate the requirement that licensees maintain the name and authorized programmer or manufacturer representative in the access log.

Department of Revenue and Regulation: Gaming Commission - Adopt new licensing categories as well as license fee schedules for hub employees, key employees, and multi-jurisdictional totalizer hub licensees; adopt rules to allow for account wagering and multi-jurisdictional simulcasting and interactive wagering totalizer hubs with the state of South Dakota.

Mr. Larry Eliason and **Mr. Mike Shaw**, Pierre, attorney for the Gaming Commission, explained the proposed rules regarding racing and Deadwood gambling. Mr. Eliason stated that the rules regarding multi-jurisdictional hubs (simulcasting) were based on the state of Oregon's rules. Mr. Shaw noted that the commission had withdrawn the proposed changes to ARSD 20:18:12.01:14 - Minimum Bankroll Requirements.

Public Testimony

Mr. Roger Tellinghuisen, Spearfish, attorney for AmWest Entertainment, LLC, testified in support of the proposed rules regarding simulcasting.

Senator Smidt moved, seconded by Senator Hundstad, to approve the rules proposed by the Department of Revenue and Regulation: Gaming Commission. Motion prevailed on a roll call vote with 5 ayes, 1 excused. Members voting aye: Hunhoff, Hundstad, Hunt, Smidt, and Thompson. Excused: Bogue.

Department of Human Services: Board of Counselor Examiners - Clarify that other state licensure requirements must meet or exceed South Dakota's requirements for licensure, remove the requirement for supervisors to provide their social security number to the board,

add the requirement that supervisees sign an agreement to adhere to the American Counseling Association Code of Ethics and Standards of Practice, and change the supervision requirements by providing more flexible supervision requirements and clearly listing the supervisor's requirements and duties, remove the requirement for supervisors to provide their social security number and add the requirement that supervisees sign an agreement to adhere to the American Association for Marriage and Family Therapists Code of Ethics.

Ms. Joyce Vos, Sioux Falls, reviewed the proposed changes.

Representative Hunt moved, seconded by Senator Smidt, to approve the rules proposed by the Department of Human Services: Board of Counselor Examiners. Motion prevailed on a roll call vote with 5 ayes, 1 excused. Members voting aye: Hunhoff, Hundstad, Hunt, Smidt, and Thompson. Excused: Bogue.

Department of Human Services: Division of Rehabilitation Services - Adopt rules to establish requirements for the cochlear implant program.

Mr. Grady Kickul reviewed the proposed rules to implement the cochlear implant program that was established in HB 1158 during the 2005 legislative session.

Representative Hunhoff asked the department to continue to study the effectiveness of an implant in only one ear versus bilateral implants.

Representative Hunt moved, seconded by Senator Hundstad, to approve the rules proposed by the Department of Human Services: Division of Rehabilitation Services. Motion prevailed on a roll call vote with 5 ayes, 1 excused. Members voting aye: Hunhoff, Hundstad, Hunt, Smidt, and Thompson. Excused: Bogue.

Department of Game, Fish and Parks - Amend rules to modify the West River Deer hunting; and regarding Furbearer Seasons close an area in the Black Hills (portions of the Spring Creek drainage in Pennington County) to beaver trapping.

Department of Game, Fish and Parks - Amend rules to modify the Antelope hunting season, the East River Deer hunting season, the Sage Grouse hunting season, and the Early Fall Canada Goose hunting season; permit the use of certain traps specifically designed to catch raccoons during specified times and locations; prohibit use of centerfire rifles on Cottonwood Lake Hatchery State Game Bird Refuge and only permit the use of shotguns (using shot shells) and bow and arrow on lands owned by the Otter Tail Power Company leased to the Department as a Game Production Area; and increase the annual park entrance license fee from \$20 to \$23 (first vehicle) and \$10 to \$11.50 (additional vehicles) and require a park entrance license for entry into Rocky Point (effective April 1, 2006) and Bob's Landing.

Mr. Doug Hansen reviewed the proposed rules for the Division of Wildlife.

Mr. Doug Hofer reviewed the proposed rules for the Division of Parks and Recreation. He stated that the last increase in the annual park entrance license fee occurred in 1995.

Representative Hunt moved, seconded by Representative Hunhoff, to approve the rules proposed by the Department of Game, Fish and Parks. Motion prevailed on a roll call vote with 5 ayes, 1 excused. Members voting aye: Hunhoff, Hundstad, Hunt, Smidt, and Thompson. Excused: Bogue.

Department of Game, Fish and Parks – Concession lease rules.

Mr. Decker explained a procedural question regarding the seventy-five day rule. The Department of Game, Fish and Parks initially held a hearing on June 2 for public comment on concession lease rules. Because of the public comments, the hearing was continued twice, July 7 and August 4. On August 5 the commission adopted final rules. Mr. Decker noted that prior to each hearing, the commission re-noticed the rules. The seventy-five day deadline is August 16 and the committee will not meet again until September 20. The question before the committee was when the seventy-five day rule commences.

Mr. Hofer commented that the concession lease rules are fairly complicated. The rules were last updated in 1990.

Following a brief discussion, Representative Hundstad moved, seconded by Representative Hunhoff, to deem the August 4, 2005, public hearing as the initial hearing date for the concession lease rules proposed by the Department of Game, Fish and Parks. Motion prevailed on a roll call vote with 5 ayes, 1 excused. Members voting aye: Hunhoff, Hundstad, Hunt, Smidt, and Thompson. Excused: Bogue.

Mr. Hansen stated that the department has two additional procedural concerns. The mountain lion season that was approved at the commission's August 4-5 meeting is set to begin on October 1 and the waterfowl season begins on September 24. Because the waterfowl season is based upon federal mandates which are not released until August and the procedural requirement that rules become effective twenty days after being filed in the Secretary of State's office, he asked if it was possible to hold a meeting via conference call in order to deal with the mountain lion and waterfowl season rules.

Following a brief discussion, it was the consensus of the committee that a conference call meeting be held on Monday, August 29, 2005, at 8:00 a.m. to hear only the waterfowl and mountain lion proposed rules.

Department of Public Safety: Emergency Medical Services - Adopt rules that will establish EMS cardiopulmonary directives for ambulance personnel.

Mr. Bob Graff reviewed the proposed rules. He distributed a copy of the proposed "EMS Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation Directive" (**Document 1**) and "Comfort One Bracelet Ordering Information" (**Document 2**). For information purposes, staff distributed a copy of HB 1162 from the 2005 legislative session (**Document 3**).

Representative Hunt suggested that the department mail information on the program to the State Bar of South Dakota for inclusion in their newsletter.

Public Testimony

Dr. LuAnn Eidsness, Sioux Falls, **Dr. Dan Heinemann**, Canton, and **Mr. Allen Eide**, Sioux Falls, Chief Assistant City Attorney, testified telephonically in support of the proposed rules. They stated that the requirement for a physician to be involved in the process was good and they felt that the rules were well written. The proposed rules will provide EMTs some sort of legal protection when they do not resuscitate.

Representative Hunhoff moved, seconded by Representative Thompson, to approve the rules proposed by the Department of Public Safety: Emergency Medical Services. Motion prevailed on a roll call vote with 5 ayes, 1 excused. Members voting aye: Hunhoff, Hundstad, Hunt, Smidt, and Thompson. Excused: Bogue.

Bureau of Personnel - Amend rules that will allow for drug testing of certain primary care employees at the South Dakota Human Services Center, Developmental Hospital, and Veterans' Home and to make changes in the procedures for drug testing of state employees so as to comply with legislation adopted by the South Dakota Legislature in 2005.

Mr. Jeff Bloomberg reviewed the proposed rules. He distributed a copy of SDCL 1-36A-20 and 1-36A-24 (**Document 4**).

In response to Representative Hunhoff suggestion that a designated "lab" be defined in the rules, Mr. Bloomberg stated that all the drug tests are done at the State Health Lab.

In response to Representative Hunt's question on the need for the first sentence in the second paragraph in ARSD 55:05:04:01, Mr. Bloomberg stated that they would review it.

Representative Hunhoff stated that food service staff should be included in the list of "direct care staff." Mr. Bloomberg stated that an amendment to include the food service staff could be done.

Senator Smidt moved, seconded by Senator Hundstad, to approve the rules proposed by the Bureau of Personnel. Motion prevailed on a roll call vote with 5 ayes, 1 excused. Members voting aye: Hunhoff, Hundstad, Hunt, Smidt, and Thompson. Excused: Bogue.

Department of Labor: Electrical Commission - Adopt the 2005 National Electrical Code, increase inspection fees, and revise local inspection system requirements.

Mr. Ron Nagle reviewed the proposed rules. He distributed a summary, including charts and maps, explaining the need for the increase in the inspection fees.

Representative Hunt voiced concern with the number of backlog of inspections. He thought that the municipalities should be able to hire their own inspectors.

Public Testimony

Mr. Todd Archambeau, Pierre, member of the Electrical Commission, voiced his concern with cities having their own inspection systems. He does not want to see our state system deteriorate because of lack of funding similar to what has happened in Iowa. In Iowa, the state has no oversight.

Mr. Harlan Nielsen, Rapid City, member of the Electrical Commission, testified in support of the proposed fee increases.

Mr. Casey Kebach, Pierre, District 10 Electrical Inspector, testified in response to Representative Hunt's concern with the backlog. He stated that most permits are for a period of three years. Because of the size or type of project, it may delay the completion time. Another issue to consider is if a local contractor is inspecting his own work. Representative Hunt responded that he is looking for a way to give the local communities an option, it would not be mandatory. Mr. Kebach stated that the eleven full-time inspectors do all of the commercial and residential inspections.

Senator Smidt moved, seconded by Representative Thompson, to approve the rules proposed by the Department of Labor: Electrical Commission. Motion prevailed on a roll call vote with 4 ayes, 1 nay, 1 excused. Members voting aye: Hunhoff, Hundstad, Smidt, and Thompson. Nay: Hunt. Excused: Bogue.

Department of Labor: Cosmetology Commission - Amend rules to set the esthetician education hours at six-hundred clock hours; delete the medical description from microdermabrasion devices; allow birds or animals in salons; require schools to have at least one electric file with attachments as part of the school's equipment; update the school curriculum for cosmetology, nail technology, and esthetics; change the required school reports and records to record clock hours or credit hours; and set hours for esthetics or nail technology school field trips.

Ms. Susan Monge reviewed the proposed rules.

Representative Hunhoff moved, seconded by Representative Thompson, to approve the rules proposed by the Department of Labor: Cosmetology Commission. Motion prevailed on a roll call vote with 5 ayes, 1 excused. Members voting aye: Hunhoff, Hundstad, Hunt, Smidt, and Thompson. Excused: Bogue.

Department of Education: Board of Education - Amend rules that will align the rules to the federal 2004 IDEA legislation to enable districts to inform in-service teachers about the new federal requirements and to allow districts to take advantage of the new flexibilities within IDEA 2004 at the start of the 2005-2006 school year; to allow educators additional means of adding endorsements and authorizations to their certificates and to clarify how the Praxis II tests will be used regarding teacher certification; to increase certification fees and records review fees to \$50; and to allow teachers with advanced certification or advanced degrees several options for renewing their certificates.

Ms. Angela Boddicker and **Ms. Melody Schopp** reviewed the proposed rules.

Senator Hundstad moved, seconded by Senator Smidt, to approve the rules proposed by the Department of Education: Board of Education. Motion prevailed on a roll call vote with 5 ayes, 1 excused. Members voting aye: Hunhoff, Hundstad, Hunt, Smidt, and Thompson. Excused: Bogue.

Department of Revenue and Regulation: Banking Commission – Adopt rules that authorize banks to provide mobile banking services to their customers; establish an application fee related to banks entering into mobile banking services; and establish a late fee for filing a renewal application for a money lending license.

Mr. Roger Novotny and **Mr. Curt Jensen**, Rapid City, attorney for the Banking Commission, reviewed the proposed rules. Mr. Novotny stated that the commission had withdrawn the proposed change to ARSD 20:07:10:02 – Application fees. The goal of the commission, in regards to the mobile banking services, is to allow state charter banks to be competitive with national charter banks.

Public Testimony

Mr. Curt Everson, Pierre, South Dakota Bankers Association, testified in support of the mobile banking rules. He stated there is a need for this type of service and it is necessary to maintain parity between the state chartered banks and the national chartered banks.

Senator Hundstad expressed concern that establishing mobile banking services was not within the statutory authority of the commission under SDCL 51A-2-14 and that it was not an

imminent problem and should be done legislatively. Representative Hunhoff also expressed her concern of setting a precedent of doing it by rule rather than statute.

Representative Hunt moved, seconded by Senator Smidt, to approve the rules proposed by the Department of Revenue and Regulation: Banking Commission.

Senator Hundstad moved a substitute motion to suspend the rules proposed by the Department of Revenue and Regulation: Banking Commission. Substitute motion died for a lack of a second.

Representative Hunt's original motion prevailed on a roll call vote with 4 ayes, 1 nay, and 1 excused. Members voting aye: Hunhoff, Hunt, Smidt, and Thompson. Nay: Hundstad. Excused: Bogue.

Department of Transportation – Amend a rule that corrects the highway numbering of an existing speed zone through the city of Roslyn to State Trunk Highway 25 in Day County.

Mr. Bill Nevin reviewed the proposed rule.

Senator Smidt moved, seconded by Representative Hunt, to approve the rule proposed by the Department of Transportation. Motion prevailed on a roll call vote with 5 ayes, 1 excused. Members voting aye: Hunhoff, Hundstad, Hunt, Smidt, and Thompson. Excused: Bogue.

Department of Transportation – Amend speed zones in the following counties: Brown, Day, and Roberts Counties – US Highway 12 from east of Aberdeen to Interstate 29; Davison, Sanborn, and Beadle Counties – SD Highway 37 from north of Mitchell to south of Huron; Yankton, Clay, and Union Counties – SD Highway 50 from east of Yankton to Interstate Highway 29; Stanley and Lyman Counties – US Highway 83 from south of Fort Pierre to Interstate Highway 90; Brown and Spink Counties – US Highway 281 from south of Aberdeen to the junction with SD Highway 20; and adopt rules for utility corridor management.

Mr. Nevin explained the utility corridor management rules. He stated that the commission had continued the public hearing on amending speed zones so those rules were not being presented at this time.

Senator Smidt moved, seconded by Representative Hunhoff, to approve the utility corridor management rules proposed by the Department of Transportation. Motion prevailed on a roll call vote with 5 ayes, 1 excused. Members voting aye: Hunhoff, Hundstad, Hunt, Smidt, and Thompson. Excused: Bogue.

Department of Revenue and Regulation: Lottery Commission – Adopt changes to the Powerball and Power Play games recently approved by the 29 participating lotteries. The changes, to take effect after the drawing of August 28, 2005, include addition of pool

numbers and changes in corresponding odds, increase in starting jackpot and second and third tier prizes, graduated annuity jackpot payments, and Power Play wheel changes.

Mr. Norm Lingle explained the proposed changes.

Representative Hunhoff moved, seconded by Representative Thompson, to approve the rules proposed by the Department of Revenue and Regulation: Lottery Commission. Motion prevailed on a roll call vote with 5 ayes, 1 excused. Members voting aye: Hunhoff, Hundstad, Hunt, Smidt, and Thompson. Excused: Bogue.

Department of Agriculture – Adopt rules to establish the South Dakota Certified Beef Program.

Secretary Larry Gabriel, Department of Agriculture, and **Secretary Jim Hagen**, Department of Tourism and State Development, and **Mr. Jafar Karim** reviewed the proposed rules. Secretary Gabriel stated that the biggest challenge was to craft something credible in the eyes of the consumer and doable by the producers. This will be a template worldwide.

Senator Smidt moved, seconded by Representative Hunt, to approve the rules proposed by the Department of Agriculture. Motion prevailed on a roll call vote with 5 ayes, 1 excused. Members voting aye: Hunhoff, Hundstad, Hunt, Smidt, and Thompson. Excused: Bogue.

Department of Revenue and Regulation: Division of Insurance – Overinsurance rule.

Mr. Randy Moses gave a brief background on the proposed rule. He stated that the proposed change allows for refund of premium when there is an overpayment of insurance.

Representative Thompson moved, seconded by Representative Hunhoff, to approve the rule proposed by the Department of Revenue and Regulation: Division of Insurance. Motion prevailed on a roll call vote with 5 ayes, 1 excused. Members voting aye: Hunhoff, Hundstad, Hunt, Smidt, and Thompson. Excused: Bogue.

Department of Social Services: Office of Child Protection Services - Amend rules to define terms; require either accreditation by the Council on Accreditation (COA) or the Joint Commission on Accreditation of Health Care Organizations (JCAHO); establish the minimum services that an intensive residential treatment center must provide; specify which children may be eligible for placement into an Intensive Residential Treatment Center; establish requirements for the center's program director, direct care staff, case managers, and counselors and therapists; establish a caseload limit; require the center to establish a treatment team for each child in care and specify those individuals who must be included on a treatment team; require the treatment team to develop case service and discharge plans and establish the minimum requirements for the plans; require the center to provide living units for the children in care and establish requirements for the staff members supervising a

living unit; establish the staff-child ratio; require a center to provide orientation and annual in-service training and establish the minimum requirements for the training; require a center to have written policy statements in certain, specified areas; establish nursing, psychiatric, and psychological service requirements; specify who is responsible for the administration of medications; require the center to periodically review the child's case service plan and provide updates to the placing agency; include an intensive residential treatment center in the definitions of "alternative care" and "facility"; require a center to provide written documentation of the need for services; allow the Department to issue a provisional license to a center under certain circumstances; require a center to meet local zoning ordinances and be approved by fire and health authorities; require the center to provide for its funding, building, and equipment needs; require the center to maintain an accounting system and provide for an annual audit; require a center to have liability insurance; establish the minimum requirements for a center's playground area, sleeping areas, and toilet facilities; and require a center to comply with the applicable provisions of chapters 67:42:01 (Provisions and Scope of Services), 67:42:07 (Group Care Centers for Minors), and 67:42:11 (Environmental Health).

Ms. Jill Wellhouse, Ms. Virgena Wieseler, and Mr. Greg Evans reviewed the proposed rules.

Public Testimony

Mr. Doug Herrmann, Rapid City, Director of Juvenile Service with the Department of Corrections, testified in support of the rules.

Senator Smidt moved, seconded by Senator Hundstad, to approve the rules proposed by the Department of Social Services: Child Protection Services. Motion prevailed on a roll call vote with 5 ayes, 1 excused. Members voting aye: Hunhoff, Hundstad, Hunt, Smidt, and Thompson. Excused: Bogue.

Department of Social Services: Office of Medical Services - Adopt rules relating to Medicaid payment for care provided to children by a residential treatment facility.

Ms. Wellhouse reviewed the proposed rules.

Senator Hundstad moved, seconded by Senator Smidt, to approve the rules proposed by the Department of Social Services: Office of Medical Services. Motion prevailed on a roll call vote with 5 ayes, 1 excused. Members voting aye: Hunhoff, Hundstad, Hunt, Smidt, and Thompson. Excused: Bogue.

Department of Social Services: Office of Economic Assistance - Amend rules that will increase the payment standard for Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF) Program.

Ms. Wellhouse reviewed the proposed rules regarding TANF.

Representative Hunt moved, seconded by Senator Hundstad, to approve the rules proposed by the Department of Social Services: Office of Economic Assistance. Motion prevailed on a roll call vote with 5 ayes, 1 excused. Members voting aye: Hunhoff, Hundstad, Hunt, Smidt, and Thompson. Excused: Bogue.

Department of Social Services: Office of Medical Services and Secretariat - Amend rules that will update by reference the latest versions of the Physicians' Current Procedural Terminology (cpt) and the International Classification of Diseases, 9th Revision, Clinical Modification (ICD-9-CM); and amend a rule that incorporates by reference the latest federal poverty levels established by the federal government.

Ms. Wellhouse reviewed the proposed rules.

Representative Hunt moved, seconded by Senator Smidt, to approve the rules proposed by the Department of Social Services: Office of Medical Services and Secretariat. Motion prevailed on a roll call vote with 5 ayes, 1 excused. Members voting aye: Hunhoff, Hundstad, Hunt, Smidt, and Thompson. Excused: Bogue.

Department of Environment and Natural Resources: Water Management Board - Amend uses assigned to streams for Minnesota River's tributaries by designating the beneficial use of warmwater semipermanent fish life propagation waters and limited contact recreation waters to Labolt Lake Creek in Grant County; for Big Sioux River Basin by designating the beneficial use of warmwater marginal fish life propagation waters and limited contact recreation waters to a segment of an unnamed tributary of Skunk Creek in Minnehaha County, designating the beneficial use of warmwater semipermanent fish life propagation waters and limited contact recreation waters to a segment of an unnamed tributary of West Pipestone Creek in Minnehaha County, designating the beneficial use of warmwater semipermanent fish life propagation waters and limited contact recreation waters to a segment of Big Ditch Creek in Union County, and designating the beneficial use of warmwater marginal fish life propagation waters and limited contact recreation waters to a segment of Big Ditch Creek in Union County; for Cheyenne River Basin by designating the beneficial use of coldwater permanent fish life propagation waters and limited contact recreation waters to a segment of Beaver Creek in Custer County; for Belle Fourche River Basin by designating the beneficial use of coldwater marginal fish life propagation waters and limited contact recreation waters to Spring Creek, a tributary to the Redwater River in Lawrence County; designating the beneficial use of coldwater marginal fish life propagation waters and limited contact recreation waters to Rubicon Gulch Creek, a tributary of Spearfish Creek in Lawrence County; for Vermillion River Basin by designating the beneficial use of warmwater marginal fish life propagation waters and limited contact recreation waters to Blind Creek, a tributary of the Vermillion River in Lincoln County.

Mr. Patrick Snyder reviewed the proposed rule changes. He stated that these changes are required by the EPA.

Representative Hunt moved, seconded by Senator Smidt, to approve the rules proposed by the Department of Environment and Natural Resources: Water Management Board.
